## PROGRAMMING

The concept includes the new Creekside Plaza and Terraces, Creekside Amphitheater, Redwood Retreat, a native plant garden supporting butterfly and bird habitat, a Riparian Promenade, a Tree House Deck, Creekside Court with enhanced retail connections, a nature play area, Gateway Plazas, a refreshed transit stop and a Green Creek Riparian Corridor. Accessible paths connect these special places within the park to each other, the downtown corridor, surrounding neighborhoods and Sir Frances Drake Boulevard.

The Creekside Plaza and Terrace is a new community space at street level with seating that steps down to a lower level for creek viewing and special events. The plaza is flanked with opportunities for al fresco dining and retail activation.

The sense of connection between downtown, the creek and park is enhanced by a **Creekside Promenade** on bridges and decks behind the existing retail buildings.

The Creek Amphitheater is developed with a new stage that faces both to the plaza and to the park lawn. This community amenity is ADA accessible and provides an exceptional experience for all people.

**Creekside Court** is a transformation of the existing service access off Sir Francis Drake. It maintains service access but transforms the feeling and uses by opening up views to the retail, providing pedestrian paving and outdoor dining and seating for adjacent businesses.

The nature based special features include a native plant gardens, a diverse native riparian garden, a butterfly habitat garden, a bird habitat garden, the riparian promenade and a nature play area.

The Redwood Retreat is underneath the existing redwood grove. New seating, decks and picnic tables create an inviting place for a picnic in the shade.

Gateways to the Commons are developed from Sir Francis
Drake and the intersection through special paving, walls, signage
and lighting. Artisan stone walls are used throughout the site as
an identity and wayfinding element.
